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New Pop-Up Exhibition Features Paintings of Lost Downtown Vistas

A gift from Regions Bank, works by artist Jim Quinlan bring the past to life

ORLANDO, Fla. — January 13, 2024 — The Orange County Regional History Center's latest pop-up exhibition, *The City Beautiful: Scenes of Downtown Orlando*, offers visitors a time trip back to well-known vistas from the heart of Orlando as they appeared in the 1930s through the 1950s.

A recent gift to the History Center's collection from Regions Bank, the exhibition displays five detailed paintings by Central Florida artist Jim Quinlan (1926-2018), who created them in the 1980s using images from earlier decades as resource material.

An architectural illustrator who studied at the Kansas City Art Institute and worked as a staff artist at Walt Disney World, Quinlan displayed great skill in bringing the scenes to life with accuracy, down to the tailfins on 1950s cars and the neon signs for popular hotels and businesses.

One of his paintings features the beautiful 1924 bandstand at Lake Eola, torn down in 1957. Designed by pathbreaking 1920s Orlando architects Ida Ryan and Isabel Roberts, the innovative structure displayed the influence of Roberts's mentor, Frank Lloyd Wright, and appeared to float on the water.

Another of Quinlan's paintings depicts the downtown skyline seen across Lake Eola at a time when the 11-story Angebilt Hotel towered over its surroundings. Other works in the exhibition highlight Orange Avenue scenes and feature the Beacham Theater in its heyday as Orlando's premier movie palace, the Streamline Moderne style of the former Rutland's building at Orange and Washington Street, and the busy commercial intersection of Orange and Central Boulevard in the 1950s.

Presented in the History Center's lobby, such short-run, pop-up displays "offer a great way to showcase recent acquisitions and topics that might not fit into a major exhibition but still tell an interesting story," says Pam Schwartz, the museum's executive director.

"For years we enjoyed displaying this artwork in our downtown Orlando branch, and when we recently renovated the branch space, we knew we had an opportunity to share these paintings with all of the Central Florida community by working with the Orange County Regional History Center," said Regions Bank Orlando Market Executive Chris Hurst. "We are honored to make this donation and share these paintings with our neighbors while helping preserve the rich history of Central Florida."

The City Beautiful: Scenes of Downtown Orlando is slated to be on display in the History Center lobby through March 31, 2024. To learn more about the museum and many programs and events, please visit TheHistoryCenter.org.
