Lunch & Learn: Colonial Plaza and the Era of the Malls Friday, September 5, 2025, Noon – 1 p.m.

The opening of Colonial Plaza in 1956 marked a change in Orlando and caused a shift away from the city's once-popular downtown business district. Throughout the following decades, the plaza would undergo several changes, including its conversion into an enclosed mall. By the 1970s and 1980s, Orlando was home to many popular malls, making it a shopping destination in Florida. Working with contributions from local historians, community organizations, and individuals, the museum has thoughtfully collected and preserved complex stories of our community. These memories, photographs, documents, and artifacts weave the intricate tapestry of our city's past.

Pocket Exhibit: The 85'ers Through October 26, 2025

Before women's soccer captured the world's attention, the 17 athletes of the first U.S. Women's National Team helped lay the foundation for the global success the sport enjoys today. Through striking portraits by acclaimed photographer and filmmaker Randy Bacon, *The 85'ers* captures the authenticity, strength, and tenacity of these groundbreaking athletes. This pocket exhibit also highlights the team's meaningful connections to Central Florida. While the team's popularity has grown nationwide, the athletes' numerous ties to the local community make their achievements even more special for fans in the Orlando area.

The Orange County Regional History Center, housed in a historic courthouse at 65 E. Central Blvd. in downtown Orlando, features four floors of permanent and special exhibitions. The museum is a Smithsonian Institution affiliate and accredited by the American Alliance of Museums.
